The Bluefaced Leicesters 'Coming Out Party'

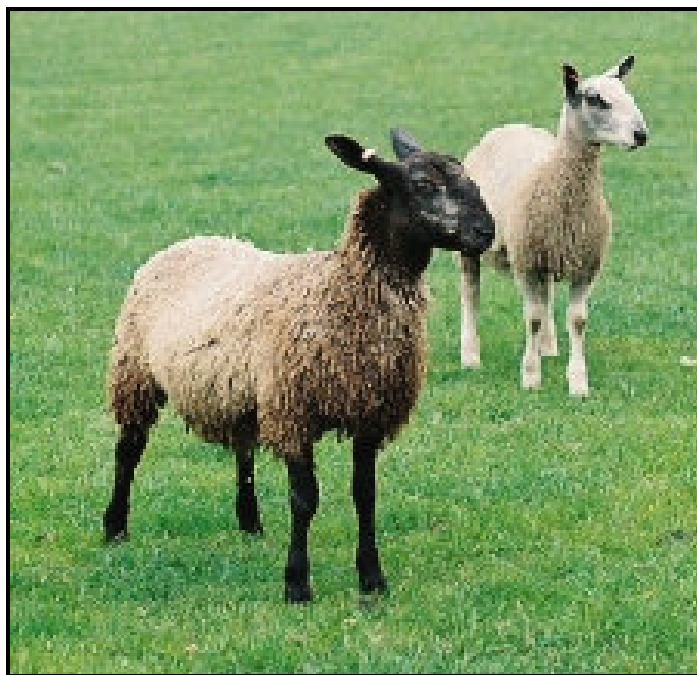
Mark your diary!

The Rhinebeck show promises to be a tremendous opportunity for the Bluefaced Leicester breed to gain increased notoriety among fellow sheep producers and fiber enthusiasts, in addition to gaining the attention and awing the public with their presence, style and personality.

The Bluefaced Leicester will be prominently featured and displayed on the promotional information and media published by the NYS Sheep & Wool Festival, such as their website, the festival catalog, calendars and posters. MULE SHEEP SOCIETY

North American Mule Sheep Society



The North American Mule Sheep Society (NAMSS) is an organization formed for the education, promotion and marketing of the sheep that comprise the crossbred breeding scheme, commonly referred to in the UK as the "3-tier system".

The 3-tier breeding scheme utilizes traditional British foundation 'Hill' ewe breeds like the Scottish Blackface, North Country and Border Cheviot, Clun Forest, and Shetland sheep. These hardy hill ewes are bred to the Bluefaced Leicester tup to produce the popular and prolific commercial ewe called the 'Mule'.

The final tier of the scheme is to utilize the heavy carcass genetics of terminal rams, the Texel and British Suffolk, to economically and efficiently produce wholesome, healthy, grass fed lamb.

Membership is open to breeders from the USA and Canada who are directly or actively involved in utilizing the 3-tier system.
